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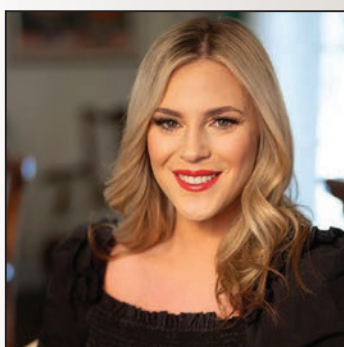


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WELCOME NEW BOARD MEMBERS

Blessings in Faithfulness

One of the most impactful life lessons my parents taught me was that persistence and faithfulness lead to a life full of blessings — sometimes the ones we hoped for, and often those we never expected.

This formula transcends all aspects of my life, from family and career to volunteer work. I learned the value of family connections by my mom's persistence in cooking family meals, preparing personalized birthday cakes, and purposely celebrating every occasion of life. She made sure that every member of the family felt valued.

I learned the lesson of faithfulness through consistent examples from my parents. After my beloved mom passed in 2017, dad started visiting church members who are no longer able to attend on Sunday mornings. Though he is almost deaf without his hearing aids, he faithfully makes his Sunday rounds with a deacon, Bill, who is legally blind. Dad jokes that together they make one whole person. Dad and Bill have been extraordinarily faithful in making their Sunday visits, bringing Holy Communion, prayers, and hope to those who might otherwise feel forgotten. Their faithfulness has resulted in immeasurable spiritual impact, not only for those they visit, but for themselves as well.

For years I've volunteered as a lector during Sunday mass, reading scripture to the congregation on a rotating schedule with others. It is something that has taken practice to do well. Earlier this year, my husband and I took a pilgrimage to Italy with a group. Included was Bishop Mark Eckman, who had pre-arranged to lead a mass in Saint Peter's Basilica during our visit to the Vatican. He invited me to lector. Upon arrival we discovered we'd been



given not a small side altar, but the grand altar behind the main one — already filled with several hundred worshipers from around the world! As I savored the magnitude and splendor of the Basilica, I thought there's no way I would actually get to read there. I was wrong. By the grace of God, I had the honor of reading scripture in the largest Christian church in the world, a blessing that will stay with me all my days.

Most of life unfolds in the routine of our daily lives. While I'm always up for a grand adventure, I also believe we are called to bloom where we are planted. Are you blooming where you're planted? I couldn't be more grateful to be "planted" at United Regional and work alongside our Foundation team — Tina, Melissa, Cindy, and myself. They're a joyful, hardworking group always giving their best so that programs, initiatives, and campaigns achieve maximum results. We know we're not working for ourselves, but rather to elevate the health of our beloved community.

Outside United Regional's Bridwell Tower, a friendly team in bright, reflective vests is always ready to lend a hand to anyone arriving. Leading the valet team is Paul McNamara, originally from Australia. His warm smile and outstanding service leave a lasting impression on everyone he meets. Paul's unmistakable accent often sparks friendly conversations, prompting guests to guess where he's from.

Paul leads a team of eight valet members. He takes great pride in the service the team delivers, knowing they do much more than park and retrieve cars. Often, team members are the first interaction patients and visitors have with United Regional, and sometimes their last, as patients prepare to return home. Customer service is of paramount importance, as the valet team is the "Welcome to United Regional" team.

Paul started working when he was 16 years old, and in January, he will celebrate 50 years in the workforce. He has served in many roles over the years, including service in the Australian Air Force, work as a salesman, service writer at auto dealerships, and correctional officer at Allred Prison.

Paul's journey to the United States involved his wife, Lisa, who was born in Wichita Falls. He has now worked at United Regional for 16 years, with the last 10 as Coordinator of Valet. Paul reports to Chris Hill, Director of Guest Services, Laundry, and Security, who describes Paul as an expert in his field.

Chris is proud of the valet team, saying, "What can you say about a team that works through any weather condition and is still able to keep a welcoming smile on their faces? I am amazed at the personal interactions the valet team has with many of our patients and visitors. Several are here for outpatient services and return frequently for their care. The Tiny Treasures Campaign to build a new Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) at United Regional received a remarkable boost thanks to a generous \$1 million donation from the James N. McCoy Foundation.

This exciting news was announced during a special ceremony on September 15, celebrating the start of construction on the new NICU. Vicki McCoy, along with Foundation trustees Ken Hines, Nancy Marks, and John Luig, attended the event to commemorate the occasion. Ken Hines shared, “We like to give our money to organizations who spend it well and provide good service. We are very proud to partner with United Regional on this important project.”

Vicki McCoy was deeply touched when she first learned about the NICU and felt compelled to get involved. Nancy Marks explained, “We couldn’t begin to imagine how painful it must be for a young mother to have her premature baby sent away to another city for specialized care immediately after birth. We are so thankful that with the new NICU at United Regional, families can stay together with their newborns right here at home.”

Nancy continued, “Vicki McCoy is a true treasure to our community, and it’s so rewarding as a trustee to witness firsthand how projects like this truly make a meaningful difference in our community.” Vicki herself feels blessed to be able to give back, believing that the impact of this gift is part of God’s bigger plan.

With the McCoy Foundation’s donation and an earlier \$1 million contribution from the Johnson Family, the \$5 million campaign is making notable progress. From Steakhouse to NICU: Ford Swanson's Recipe for Giving Back



If you've enjoyed delicious Texas beef at McBrides Steakhouse on Maplewood, you've probably met the owner, Ford Swanson. Ford is not only hands-on at his restaurant, but he's also deeply committed to giving back to the community—especially when it comes to kids' health at United Regional.

Ford's motivation comes from a deeply personal place. Twelve years ago, his wife, Ashley, went into preterm labor nine weeks early. Thanks to the dedicated women's and children's team at United Regional, the Swansons welcomed their daughter, Caroline, who weighed just over four pounds and spent a month in the Special Care Nursery. Ashley shared, "Everyone was wonderful and truly cared. It's very scary seeing your tiny newborn with wires and tubes, but the staff were patient, knowledgeable, and always explained what was happening."

Ford was grateful to have Ashley and Caroline at United Regional for the advanced care they needed. "I can't imagine trying to balance work and driving two hours away to visit my wife and newborn. It meant everything to have them close by to support them," he shared.

Ford knows firsthand how valuable the expansion of United Regional's nursery to a Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) will be, as it will allow even more families to stay close to home when tiny newborns arrive. "Being able to have family support nearby will relieve additional stress during an already stressful and scary time. Not having to worry about the cost of hotel stays, food, and gas will lift a huge financial burden from these families."



Today, Caroline is thriving — she's in seventh grade, on a competitive dance team, and maintains straight A's in advanced classes. When she's not dancing or studying, she loves spending time with her friends.

While Ford is grateful for how well Caroline is doing, he will never forget the challenges in her early days. Putting his gratitude into action, Ford, through McBride's Steakhouse, sponsors many community events, including those benefiting United Regional. He explains, "I enjoy giving back to the community that has given so much to me and my family. I grew up in Wichita Falls, and I want to see our city flourish and grow."



Nursery Superstars Deliver Hope Through Compassionate Care

Welcoming a new baby into the world is typically a time of joy and celebration for families, a moment when hearts swell with hope and anticipation. Yet, for some, this journey brings unexpected challenges — whether it's the early arrival of a fragile infant weighing just a few pounds or a full-term newborn who suddenly needs specialized care. At United Regional, the presence of a dedicated team of neonatologists, pediatricians, and highly skilled bedside nurses ensures that every newborn and new mother receives expert, compassionate care. These remarkable nurses spend countless hours, sometimes extending into weeks or even months, alongside families, forming bonds of trust, encouragement, and love as they support the tiny patients on their journeys toward health and home. This path is filled with poignant moments — fear, vulnerability, hope, and the triumph of milestones as the littlest ones grow stronger each day.

While United Regional is blessed with an entire team of loving bedside caregivers, Avis Harris, Director of Women's and Children's Services, and Amanda Quezada, Nursery Manager, invite you behind the doors of our Special Care Nursery to meet nurses pictured below (L-R) Abigail Carr, Denise Hobbs, Carol Bell, Ashley Avara, Jocelyn Hernandez and Jordan Love.

For Denise, taking care of babies isn't just a career, but a calling that began in the most personal way — as a NICU mother herself. The compassion and skilled care her family received during a time of both heartbreak and hope inspired her to give back and offer the same comfort to others. Having experienced firsthand the difference consistent, loving care can make, Denise strives to be a source of peace to families facing uncertainty.

For Joycelyn, the journey is equally heartfelt. Her son, Juan, was born with a critical heart defect, requiring three months of NICU care. The nurses who cared for her family gave more than medical expertise — they provided compassion, hope, and understanding during a terrifying chapter. Their example became her inspiration, fueling her desire to offer the same support to others.

Every day, these nurses bear witness to the raw, sacred moments of parenthood. **Abby** expresses how honored she feels to minister to families in their most vulnerable times, while **Carol** finds deep purpose in not just treating her tiny patients, but also lending a reassuring voice to parents overwhelmed by the complexities of their baby's care. The emotional highs are profound; **Ashley** treasures the instant a mother holds her newborn for the first time, no matter how



small or how many children have come before. **Jordan** shares that placing a baby, skin-to-skin, in a mother's arms for that first embrace, never fails to move her to tears alongside the grateful parents. For Joycelyn, being a part of those moments — when stress becomes peace, sadness becomes happiness, and an overwhelming experience becomes gratitude — is something she will always cherish: proof that even the most difficult beginnings can lead to beautiful outcomes.

Jordan, Joycelyn, Denise, Abby, Carol, and Ashley all recognize how expanding the nursery into a Level III NICU will make a significant impact on families and the broader community. Abby points out that it's often too risky for new mothers to travel with their babies to another city for specialized care. With this expansion, mothers and babies no longer must endure the pain and difficulty of being separated or the challenge of traveling long distances for advanced treatment. Families can now concentrate on recovery and bonding at home, surrounded by a team that knows how important every moment is. Jordan appreciates that this change will spare families the financial and emotional stress that comes with having to transfer their newborns out of town.

The addition of neonatologists has brought an incredible level of expertise to the nursery team, allowing more babies to remain at United Regional and bringing a new level of knowledge and teamwork to the staff. As Carol notes, this expansion has truly strengthened United Regional's ability to serve a wide array of needs, giving every newborn the best possible start.

The nurses' stories are filled with unforgettable moments that speak to the resilience of their smallest patients and the dedication of their team. Joycelyn recalls the countless tiny fighters she's helped stabilize — some weighing barely more than a bag of sugar — where every heartbeat felt like a precious, fragile victory. Yet, **through the unwavering care of their families and the nursery team, these babies grow, meet milestones, and eventually thrive.** Ashley and Abby find joy and affirmation in seeing former patients and their families out in the world, no longer defined by their rocky beginnings, but full of laughter and life. It's in these smiles and giggles that the true reward of nursing shines through — reminding all who serve that their work is not only skilled and compassionate, but also profoundly meaningful and life-changing.

United Regional Breaks Ground on New Imaging Center to Enhance Patient Care in Wichita Falls

To better serve our patients, United Regional has started construction on a new Imaging Center located just south of Bridwell Tower at the corner of 12th and Alma Streets in Wichita Falls. Mark Wright, Director of Radiology and Outpatient Diagnostics, shared, “We are incredibly excited to bring this new outpatient Imaging Center to our community — a milestone that represents much more than just a new building. At United Regional, our mission has always been to deliver high-quality, compassionate care, and this new center is a testament to that commitment.”

Expected to be completed in December 2026, the two-story, 53,000-square-foot facility will feature the latest in imaging innovation in a setting thoughtfully designed for both comfort and convenience. Patients will benefit from expert technologists, high-quality imaging delivered with accuracy and compassion, and the ability to self-schedule appointments. Streamlined access to services and results will respect patients’ time and health priorities.

Mark added, “With state-of-the-art imaging technology — including MRIs, CTs, X-rays, mammograms, and ultrasounds — and emphasis on patient comfort and convenience, we’re not just offering diagnostic services, we’re elevating the entire healthcare experience for everyone we serve. This is a huge step forward, and we are so grateful for the support and trust of our community as we continue to build a healthier tomorrow, together.”

The Imaging Center will also include a retail pharmacy, which will make it easier for patients to obtain their discharge medications, thereby reducing hospital readmissions.

Staff will also have convenient access to personal medication through the retail pharmacy. This new facility is part of United Regional’s Master Facilities Plan, designed to address the growing healthcare needs of our community.
